

From the Pastor's Pen

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say, rejoice! The Lord is near."

The third Sunday of Advent is traditionally called *Gaudete Sunday*. *Gaudete* is the Latin word meaning "rejoice." This Sunday is so named because "Rejoice" is the first word in the entrance antiphon for today's Mass taken from Philippians 4:4,5: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I say, rejoice! The Lord is near." Some people mark this Sunday on their Advent wreath with a pink candle instead of a purple candle. This Sunday is a joyful reminder that our salvation is near.

This week's Gospel Reading continues our Advent reflection on the person of John the Baptist. John's preaching was persuasive as many repented of sin and believed in the coming of Messiah. Many were baptized by John in the wilderness, too. John received the honor of being the only prophet who was able to point his finger to Messiah in the flesh, Jesus Christ. Within the narrative of Matthew, John the Baptists helps establish the identity of Jesus. But in today's gospel John is not so sure. He sends word to Jesus from prison, asking if Jesus is the Messiah for whom he has been waiting. To express his doubt and his disappointment he sends his disciples to ask Jesus, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?" Jesus responds by pointing to the miracles that he has worked and invites John and the other hearers to make their own determination. May the Lord help us with graces to acknowledge and accept him as our savior.

As Advent quickly moves along, I encourage you to be sure and take some time for quiet in your life to reflect upon the great mysteries we celebrate at this time of the year. For those planning on celebrating the Sacrament of Penance before Christmas, I remind you to be sure to note the times when confessions will be offered at both the churches and at the cathedral

Tomorrow, December 12, we celebrate Our Lady of Guadalupe. It was in 1531 that Mary appeared to Juan Diego (The feast of St. Juan Diego was celebrated on December 9) on Tepeyac Hill outside Mexico City. Mary, under the title of Our Lady of Guadalupe, is patroness of the Americas and recently was designated as patroness of Respect Life. Happy feast to everyone.

In 1988, the Catholic bishops of the United States launched the Retirement Fund for Religious to address the significant lack of retirement funding for Catholic sisters, brothers, and priests in religious orders. There will be a second collection after communion at Masses today for the Religious Retirement Fund. There is also an envelope found in the bulletin. On behalf of the many retired women, religious sisters and retired religious priests and brothers I thank you for your generous assistance. Have a blessed week.

This year will be slightly different. The Annual Appeal for the 2022-2023 year has been incorporated into the Inspired by the Spirit Campaign. This comprehensive, all-parish campaign effort began in parishes this past spring and is being conducted throughout this fall and through the first half of 2023. It will not only incorporate and support the ministries through the Diocesan Annual Appeal but will also provide an opportunity for every parish in the Diocese to raise funds for their own parish needs, the Diocesan Center, and the new Catholic Foundation of West Central Wisconsin. Our parish is assigned to the second block of the campaign timeline. You will be hearing more details in the coming months. Please begin to pray about your commitment to this campaign and know that we will be inviting you to participate after the New Year. While the Inspired by the Spirit campaign will include this year's Diocesan Annual Appeal, it will benefit our own parish and the larger Church of La Crosse for years to come. The Diocese plans to raise \$40,000,000. Our parish goal over a 5 year time period is \$85,000 with \$55,250 coming back to our parish for our own needs and projects.
