Message for the week of April 2:

Jesus wants to live in our heart always: At the Last Supper, Jesus gave His Apostles – the first priests – the power to change the bread and wine into His Body and Blood. All priests have received this same power. At Mass, as the priest speaks the words of Jesus, the bread and wine become His Body and Blood by the power of the Holy Spirit. Jesus wants us to receive Him at Mass every Sunday because He wants to live in our heart. Let's pray this right now and every day this week. "Thank you Jesus for Father Biju as he stands in for You, and thereby, we are able to receive You in Holy Communion at Mass". This week, read the passage of Jesus instituting the Holy Eucharist at the Last Supper in Matthew 26:26-28.

Holy Week

Did you know that this week is the most important one in the whole year? Holy Week has Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. On these days we remember and celebrate the most important things that Jesus did before His resurrection on Easter Sunday.

On Holy Thursday Jesus said the first Mass and made his apostles the first priests. Go to Mass on Thursday if you can, and think about what Jesus did- He made bread and wine into Himself so that He could still be with us after He went back into Heaven.

On Good Friday Jesus suffered terribly and then died on the cross because of our sins. He offered up His life, even though He had never sinned, so that all of us could go to Heaven. That's why we call it "Good" Friday. Can you offer some sacrifice to Jesus in return for what He did for you?

On Holy Saturday Jesus' body was in the tomb. His friends were all shocked by what had happened and were afraid and sad. They did not remember what was going to happen next... Do you remember what happened after Holy Saturday?

From the Pastor's Pen

"Hosanna to the Son of David"

With Passion (Palm) Sunday we begin our Holy Week. It takes us to the liturgies of the Triduum—Holy Thursday's Mass of the Lord's Supper, the Good Friday of the Lord's Passion, and the Easter Vigil. On Palm Sunday we recall Jesus' entry into the holy city, Jerusalem with the greetings 'hosanna to the Son of David," the salutation to a deliverer, the Messiah. People celebrate the joy of the Messiah. It was short lived. The joy of the entry into Jerusalem is replaced by fear as we move on. The disciples who celebrated a final meal with Jesus, all desert him. The fear among the disciples losses its grip only after the post resurrection apparitions of Jesus.

Before his Passion he had his last meal with his chosen ones. The liturgy of Holy Thursday celebrates the last supper of the Lord and the various events of the night before Jesus suffered his Passion. The institution of the Holy Eucharist, the institution of the priesthood and the new commandment to love is celebrated on this day. On Holy Thursday at end of the service we are led to silence, adoration, thankfulness to the Lord in the blessed sacrament.

The liturgy of the Good Friday is solemn. If Holy Thursday points to the sacramental outpouring of the Lord, then Good Friday points to the graphic emptying of Christ. He faces the cruelty of death, betrayal, pain, abandonment and humiliation. The passion narrative tells us all. "Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross". Philippines 2:6-11. The Good Friday liturgy shows us how much Christ loved us. Christ gives us his life, body and spirit. In the light of the death of Christ we stand in awe and profound silence. Christ redeems us though his humanity which remains faithful to God. Jesus' faithfulness undoes or redeems our unfaithfulness.

Holy Saturday is a day of great silence in the church. Mass is not celebrated. Sacraments are not celebrated. We are called to face the meaning of the death of Christ in our lives. The liturgy of the Easter vigil begins at night with kindling of the new fire and the Easter proclamation." rejoice heavenly powers...." The Easter liturgy and Easter season announces the resurrection of Christ. We profess our faith that he is our Lord. Easter is the reason of our hope. Jesus is life. Have a blessed Holy Week

Holy Week, Abortion, and the Wisconsin Supreme Court Race: The PBS Wisconsin headline on Feb. 22 got right to the point: "National debate over abortion turns to Wisconsin Supreme Court race." It was referring to the election that will take place on Tuesday, April 4. Media coverage of the two Supreme Court candidates and their philosophies is widespread, and abortion has been the constant focal point. As we inform ourselves, and then cast our vote on April 4 – Tuesday of Holy Week – let us cherish the fact that Jesus himself took on flesh as a tiny, developing child in the womb of Mary, so that one day, on the Cross of Calvary, he might rescue us from darkness and sin. Likewise, every preborn child is in the image of the Lord who created and redeemed us.
